Dear Mr. Campbell:

The staff has under consideration the Family Stations, Inc. ("Family") June 10, 2003 request¹ for a waiver of the Commission's main studio requirement, 47 C.F.R. Section 73.1125, in order to operate KQFR(FM), Rapid City, South Dakota, as a satellite of its commonly owned noncommercial educational ("NCE") station, KYFR(AM), Shenandoah, Iowa.² Family states that it originally proposed to construct a main studio in Rapid City, South Dakota, in an application which was filed in April 1998. However, in February 1999, Family sought a waiver of the Commission's main studio rule, on a network-wide basis, for its existing stations. This request remained pending at the time the construction permit for KQFR(FM) was granted on August 8, 2002, and Family felt that it was appropriate to wait and see if the network-wide waiver request was granted and, if so, under what conditions before requesting a waiver for the KQFR(FM) main studio. The Commission granted the network-wide waiver in September 2002 and the current waiver request was filed on June 10, 2003.

Pursuant to Section 73.1125(a), a main studio must be located either (1) within a station's principal community contour, (2) within the contour of any other broadcast station licensed to its community, or (3) within 25 miles of the center of its community³. However, under Section

73.1125(b)(2), the Commission will waive these requirements where "good cause" exists to do so and where the proposed studio location "would be consistent with the operation of the station in the public interest." Each waiver request by an NCE station seeking to operate as the satellite of another NCE station is considered on a case-by-case basis. The Commission has recognized the benefits of centralized operations for NCE stations, given their limited funding, and thus found "good cause" exists to waive the main studio location requirement where satellite operations are proposed.⁴ A satellite station must, however, demonstrate that it will meet its local service obligation to satisfy the Section 73.1125 "public interest" standard.⁵

Family proposes to operate KQFR(FM), Rapid City, South Dakota, as a satellite station of KYFR(AM), Shenandoah, Iowa, approximately 570 miles from Rapid City. Where there is a great distance between parent and satellite stations, as here, and where the parent and satellite stations are in different states, we are particularly concerned that the licensee take adequate measures to maintain its awareness of the satellite community's needs and interests. To that end, the staff of Family has pledged to engage in a quarterly ascertainment of the community needs and interests of Rapid City by: (1) maintaining regular contact with part time employees and volunteers who live in Rapid City; (2) traveling to Rapid City on a regular basis to strengthen community contacts; (3) subscribing to the local newspaper, *The Rapid City Journal*; (4) airing a minimum of 45 minutes per week of local Public Affairs programming as determined by its ascertainment efforts; (5) maintaining program origination capability at the KQFR(FM) transmitter in order to be able to directly originate and broadcast programming; (6) maintaining a duplicate public inspection file for KQFR(FM) in Rapid City; (7) responding to mail sent to KQFR(FM) at the parent station; (8) have a paid employee or contract engineer and various volunteers available, as needed, in Rapid City; and (9) maintain a toll-free telephone number between Rapid City and the main studio of KYFR(AM).

In these circumstances, we are persuaded that Family will meet its local service obligations and thus, that grant of the requested waiver is consistent with the public interest. However, we remind Family, of the requirement that it maintain a public file for KQFR(FM) at the main studio of the "parent" station, KYFR(AM). It must also make reasonable accommodation for listeners wishing to examine the file's contents⁶. We further remind Family that, notwithstanding the grant of the waiver requested here, the public file for KQFR(FM) must contain the quarterly issues and programs list for Rapid City, South Dakota, required by 47 C.F.R. Section 73.3527(e)(8).


