Re: Objection of Mobile Radio Partners Inc. application for 2 FM translators
File No. (BNPFT-2017120AJQ)

Dear FCC:

Please accept this informal objection as Vice –President of Mobile Radio Partners Inc. and as a former partner in Black owned WCLM (who sold the station to Mobile radio Partners Inc.), situated in a low income area of Richmond, Va. I owned the site and the station for over twenty years with paid programs. We utilized the best practices to serve the community. To that end, the radio programs included R&B music, Latin jazz, sports talk, gospel music, church services, sermons and community talk shows. These shows were also streamed on the internet.

In negotiating this sale and forming the new company Mobile Radio Partners Inc. it was promised that the shows would be retained, my input would be sought in organizing the new station programming.

Mobile Radio Partner Inc. President Michael Mazursky nefariously cajoled me to enter an agreement with knowledge that this agreement not be upheld, as proven by Michael Mazursky's actions and subsequent breaches, as outline below:

- (a) Michael Mazursky failed to continue with any of previous shows and paid programs that generated monthly income
- (b) All of the African American and Spanish shows were removed from the station programming. The African American and Spanish community in Richmond, Virginal has reacted with profound grief, sadness, and disbelief. - (c) Michael Mazusky filed paperwork with the Federal Communication and the paperwork submitted to FCC has inconsistent documents, of ownership and partnership agreements.
- (e) The forming of Mobile Radio Partners Inc. was based on malicious, fraudulent, oppressive misrepresentation which has seriously affected and saddened thousands of patriotic and positively contributing African Americans and Spanish people, as well as the thousands who has listen by internet, who have always loved and respected the United States of America. At least two stories have appeared in the press one by Richmond Virginia major African American newspaper the Richmond Free Press by staff writer Jeremy M. Lazarus. As Vice-President of Mobile Radio Partners Inc. I am objecting to the approval of the pending Application for 2 FM Translators because of the fraudulent agreements presented and Mobile Radio Partners Inc. is already involved in a web of legal conflict.

WCLM loses last independent, black-owned radio station

WCLM, the last independent, African-American radio station in Richmond, is off the air.

Why are part of a tangled web of ownership? WCLM became a community radio. Richmond politicians and on the station that featured an ongoing from community affairs and sports talk, traditional gospel and

Meanwhile, many of the shows that were WCLM staples have migrated to WQCN "The Choice" 105.3 FM, a low-powered station that a Richmond church owns and operates. Others shows are being streamed over a new internet station, Richmond Soul Radio, which Preston T. Brown, former general manager and part owner of WCLM, has created.

Mr. Brown is not shy about giving his version of what happened to WCLM. He has spoken about it on YouTube videos he released and in lawsuits he filed in Richmond courts.

In a suit filed Wednesday, Mr. Brown claims that members of Mobile Radio Partners that bought the station duped him and have failed to pay him an agreed upon salary of \$3,000 a month.

ing to Mr. Brown, Mobile Radio purchased a \$300,000 loan to fuel ns, which, with FCC approval, purchase of WCLM, buy-out WREJ from a Delaware group, simulcasting both stations FM translators to allow he heard on the FM band ne.

To Mr. Brown, Mr. Mazursky had some credibility. In radio since 1980, Mr. Mazursky had worked in Phoenix and Chicago before coming to Richmond to start WVNZ 990 AM in 1997.

Mr. Mazursky's online information states that he helped start seven Richmond radio stations under his AM Communications banner before he and other partners sold their interests to Davidson Media Group of Charlotte.

Mr. Brown said he initially agreed that it was a good plan and went along with the deal. That included shutting down WCLM to allow Mobile Radio Partners to replace the failing transmitter, make other station improvements and repair the WCLM tower in Highland Springs.

"It was supposed to take 30 days," Mr. Brown said, "but it dragged on into late October. We could have stayed on the air, but (Mr. Mazursky) would not allow it."

After the station returned to the air, Mr. Brown said he was astonished when Mr. Mazursky on Nov. 6 introduced the new call sign, WUWN, cut Sunday programming that ministers were paying for and then eliminated the rest of the programming.

Mr. Brown produced financial information indicating that the fees and advertising for the WCLM programs were bringing in

about \$6,000 a week, all of which disappeared after Mr. Mazursky moved to an all-music format.

Mr. Brown also said he noticed that payments Mr. Mazursky promised, including \$3,000 a month salary, never materialized.

Mr. Brown said he went to "The Choice" to help former WCLM shows gain a new home. And earlier this month, he launched Richmond Soul Radio, the internet station.

According to emails, Mr. Mazursky offered to buy Mr. Brown's share in Mobile Radio Partners for \$1,000 and pay him to sell advertising. Mr. Brown rejected the offer and countered with a request for \$100,000.

Mr. Mazursky has not responded to Free Press texts, emails or phone calls seeking comment.

Attorney Gary Schwartz of Richmond, a minority partner in Mobile Radio Partners who has handled the legal paperwork, has denied Mr. Brown's claims in email responses to Mr. Brown.

Amid the legal disputes, Mr. Brown said that he is not in a position now to bring back WCLM and its community programming. He also is making no promises that will ever happen.
