

Detail of Adverse Findings

Michael G. Hubbard was initially charged with 23 counts of violating Alabama's "Code of Ethics for Public Officials, Employees, Etc.," §§ 36-25-1 to -30, Ala. Code 1975 ("the Ethics Code"). On June 3, 2016, Michael G. Hubbard, former Speaker of the Alabama House of Representatives was convicted in an Alabama state trial court of 12 felony counts under the state Ethics Code *See* State of Alabama v. Hubbard, Michael Gregory, CC-2014-000565.00 (Lee County Circuit Court). Of the 12 counts arising from the trial court convictions, higher courts reversed 6; accordingly, there are now 6 counts remaining.

On August 5, 2016, Hubbard moved for a judgment of acquittal, a dismissal of the charges or a new trial in the Circuit Court of Lee County, Alabama.

On August 27, 2018, the Alabama Court of Criminal Appeals affirmed the convictions on 11 counts and reversed the conviction on 1 count.

On October 11, 2018, Hubbard filed an appeal to the Alabama Supreme Court and on March 11, 2019 a Writ of Certiorari was granted.

On April 10, 2020, the Alabama Supreme Court issued an opinion which reversed as to 5 counts and upheld 6 counts.

On April 24, 2020, Hubbard filed an Application for Rehearing with the Supreme Court as to the remaining 6 counts.

On August 28, 2020, the Supreme Court of Alabama ruled on the Application for Rehearing and issued a Certificate of Judgment. Simultaneously, the Supreme Court remanded the case to the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Mr. Hubbard plans to timely file an appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. Further updates will be filed as the appeals process continues.
